Loch Ness

Home to the Loch Ness Monster, affectionately known as “Nessie”, Loch Ness spans approximately 37km and offers stunning scenery.

Culloden Battlefield

Historical site of the final confrontation of the Jacobite rising of 1745 and part of a religious civil war in Britain. The conflict was the last pitched battle fought on British soil.

Dolphin Watching

Just north of Inverness, over the Kessock Bridge lies the village of North Kessock. The shoreline offers excellent dolphin spotting opportunities over the Beaully Firth.

Urquhart Castle

Castle ruins dating from the 13th to the 16th centuries, though built on the site of an early medieval fortification. Located beside Loch Ness.

Inverness Castle

The red sandstone structure here today was built in 1836 by architect William Burn. It's built on the site of an 11th-century defensive structure. Today, it houses Inverness Sheriff Court. A succession of castles has stood on this site since 1057.

Cawdor Castle

Cawdor Castle dates from the late 14th century, having been built as a private fortress by the Thanes of Cawdor, with the ancient medieval tower built around the legendary holly tree.
